Christmastide begins on the 25th of December and ends on the January 6th, but we'll end our celebration in the evening on January 5th.

Commonly called the Twelve Days of Christmas, it has a deep, rich, history as far back as 567 A.D., when the Council of Tours proclaimed the twelve days from Christmas to Epiphany as a sacred and festive season.

## December 25th

The first day of Christmastide is better known as Christmas, but it's only the first day of our celebration. Today we embark on a journey to the 12th day of Christmas, what the church has traditionally called Epiphany!

Today we celebrate Jesus. The coming of the Messiah is not only foretold from the very first book of the Bible, but every book of the Bible points to Jesus as its central character. Jesus is not only the "reason for the season," He is the hope and promise of every story within scripture. See if you can find Him within the prophecies of these liturgical readings:

Isaiah 52:7–10, Psalm 98 (3), Hebrews 1:1–4, and John 1:1–14.

But when Jesus calls, you answer. John went on to write the fourth Gospel, three Epistles and possibly the book of Revelation.
