Whether you read them around the table, during morning time, or in a classroom, my prayer is that these cards remind you that God's people have always told time differently—by the life of Christ, who holds all our days.

Advent is a four-week season leading to Christmas Day. In the early church, Advent looked forward to the Second Coming of Christ but over time came to focus more on His first coming to Bethlehem. Advent began as a three-day fast and vigil (similar to Easter) which eventually expanded to about 40 days of fasting leading to the "feast" of Christmas. Each Sunday of Advent has a focus: hope, peace, joy, and love.

DISCUSSION

The candles we light for Advent are pink and purple, often in a wreath. Have you ever lit an Advent wreath?

Originally known as Christ's Mass, Christmas is the height of the Advent season. This holiday celebrates the traditional date of Jesus's birth on December 25th (the Eastern church celebrates on January 7th; they use the Julian calendar). Christmas is not just one day, though—it's twelve! From Christmas Day to Epiphany on January 6th, a series of feasts focused on the life of Jesus and the apostles are celebrated. This is where the song "The 12 Days of Christmas" comes from.
